MAULDIN, CAVINESS TO DISCUSS ECONOMIC OUTLOOK IN 1989

FAYETTEVILLE, NC--Robert R. Mauldin, chairman and chief executive officer of Peoples Bank and Trust Co., will deliver the "Outlook for 1989" address at the Economic Outlook Symposium Thursday, November 17 at 7 p.m.

"In this election year, there is a great uncertainty about the future course of the American economy," said Dr. Sid Gautam, economics professor at Methodist.

"Mr. Mauldin is in a good position to know what we can expect in 1989."

Mr. Mauldin joined Peoples Bank and Trust Co. in 1969 as executive vice president. He became president in 1981 and chairman and CEO in 1985. He holds a B.S. in business administration from the University of North Carolina of Chapel Hill and has done postgraduate work at the University of Oklahoma and Louisiana State University.

Mauldin has been active in the civic and business life of Rocky Mount. He is currently a director of Downtown Renaissance, Inc.; Triangle East; and the Nash County Industrial Development Commission. He is past president of the Rocky Mount Chamber of Commerce, the United Way, and the Rocky Mount Kiwanis Club.

Dr. William Robert Caviness, president of the Fayetteville Area Chamber of Commerce, will deliver the second keynote address, entitled "Outlook for Cumberland County."

Dr. Caviness is a local dentist. He is a graduate of the UNC School of Dentistry and served his residency at Duke University Medical Center.

METHODIST COLLEGE TO HOLD FORUM ON CONSTITUTIONAL ISSUES

FAYETTEVILLE, NC--Methodist College will hold a forum entitled "Life, Death, and the U.S. Constitution" Wednesday, Nov. 16 at 6:30 p.m. in the Student Union. The public is invited.

A panel of medical, legal, and ethical experts will discuss the U.S. Constitution in relation to issues of individual choice such as "allowing" a life to end, reproductive rights, and other biomedical issues.

Panel members will include: Gerald Beaver, an attorney with the Fayetteville law firm of Beaver, Thompson, Holt and Richardson; Dr. Charles Ellenbogen, Director of Internal Medicine, Fayetteville Area Health Education Center; and the Rev. Randy Hillman, Clinical Care Chaplain, Forsyth Memorial Hospital in Winston-Salem, N.C.

Ms. Wendy Riddle, WFNC radio news personality, will serve as moderator of the panel discussion. Members of the audience will have the opportunity to ask questions and contribute to the discussion.

The forum is the latest in a series of events being held at Methodist to commemorate the bicentennial of the U.S. Constitution.
