## Dr. Mark Wethington



Dr. Mark Wethington is president of the Wesley Heritage Foundation (WHF). He participated in the founding of the WHF twenty years ago, and has been instrumental in its work and formation over the years. For 28 years, he served as a local pastor of United Methodist Churches in the North Carolina Conference. He has founded several non-profit organizations, including the Moore Free Care Clinic (serving the low income and uninsured of Moore County) and Family Promise (housing homeless families in churches). He has been instrumental, on behalf of the Wesley

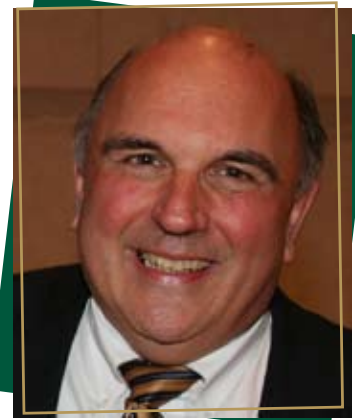
Heritage Foundation, in founding the Wesley Theological Seminary in Lima, Peru, which opened for classes in August 2009.

Wethington served as an adjunct professor at Duke Divinity School for many years and has been a guest lecturer at the University of Bonn (Germany), Wesley Theological Seminary in Washington D.C., and the Methodist Seminary in Mexico. He has taught numerous seminars in Peru, Guatemala and other Latin American countries. While Wethington's Ph.D. from Duke University is in *New Testament* studies and Christian origins, with a minor in systematic theology, he has specialized in Wesleyan theology and practical ministries in social justice.

## Dr. Stan McDaniel

Dr. Stan McDaniel holds a Doctor of Musical Arts in Church Music from the University of Southern California (USC). In 1984, the USC faculty voted him "Outstanding Graduate of the Graduate School in Music." Dr. McDaniel also holds a master's degree in vocal performance and choral conducting from the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill. He completed his undergraduate work at Shenandoah Conservatory in Winchester, Va., and he has over 40 years of experience as a church musician—with much of it being in the United Methodist Church.

Dr. McDaniel has appeared before audiences as a professional singer and orchestral conductor. He is a published composer and an in-demand lecturer of church music, and he currently serves as an adjunct professor of sacred music at East Carolina University.





## Dr. Kenneth Collins

Dr. Kenneth J. Collins is a professor of Wesley studies and historical theology at Asbury Theological Seminary. He is an ordained elder in the United Methodist Church. He recently received the “Professor of the Year Award for Excellence in Teaching and Learning” from Asbury Theological Seminary in May of 2008. While Dr. Collins was at Methodist University, he was recognized for “Exemplary Teaching” in a national competition among United Methodist Schools, and he was the recipient of the “Black Student Movement Award for Excellence in Religious Education.” He has authored dozens of articles in the field of Wesley studies, books in the area of spirituality and in American religion, and five key books, including his most recent work, *The Theology of John Wesley: Holy Love and the Shape of Grace*, published by Abingdon Press. He lectures around the globe and is on the faculty at the Baltic Methodist Theological Seminary in Tallinn, Estonia. Dr. Collins is the past president of the Wesleyan Theological Society.

He is married to Marilyn Krisnowich and they have two daughters: Brooke Erin, who is a graduate of Asbury College, and Lauren Anne, a sophomore at the University of Kentucky.
