

Student-Right-To-Know

Methodist University has graduation rate* of 38 percent for full-time new freshmen who entered in Fall 2009 in pursuit of a baccalaureate degree as of Fall 2015. This information is provided pursuant to requirements of the Student-Right-to-Know and Campus Security Act of 1990.

So what does our **38** percent graduation rate mean? This rate means that 38 percent of all freshmen who began their collegiate career at Methodist University (MU) in Fall 2009 graduated from MU in six years. *Graduation rates are a measure of the success of students in attaining their educational goals. A graduation rate is the percentage of students in a given entering cohort (group) who graduated within a specified period of time. The number of students in the entering cohort is the denominator of the rate; the number of students graduating is the numerator of the rate. The entering cohort of an institution includes all full-time, first-time degree or certificate-seeking undergraduate students who began in the stated cohort year. The time period is 150% of normal time to program completion (for example, for a four-year program, the graduation rate would include students who had graduated within six years of the beginning of the program).
