

## **Student-Right-To-Know**

Student-Right-to-Know and Campus Security Act of 1990 requires Methodist University to disclose the Graduation Rate for First-time Full-time Freshmen. The Graduation Rate for First-time Full-time Freshmen is **40.5** percent.

So what does our **40.5** percent graduation rate mean? This rate means that 40.5 percent of all freshman who began their collegiate career at Methodist University (MU) in Fall 2014 graduated from MU in six years. \*Graduation rates are a measure of the success of students in attaining their educational goals. A graduation rate is the percentage of students in a given entering cohort (group) who graduated within a specified period. The number of students in the entering cohort is the denominator of the rate; the number of students graduating is the numerator of the rate. The entering cohort of an institution includes all full-time, first-time degree or certificate-seeking undergraduate students who began in the stated cohort year. The period is 150% of normal time to program completion (for example, for a four-year program, the graduation rate would include students who had graduated within six years of the beginning of the program).
