

Research Question

"What accounts for differences in attitudes among Americans concerning capital punishment?"



Background:

Capital Punishment: Ever present institution since America's inception In the 20th Century debates about the legality of the capital punishment were taken to the Supreme Court

1972: *Furman v. Georgia* struck down capital punishment statutes

1976: Gregg v. Georgia reaffirmed capital punishment

There are currently 2738 death row inmates in the United States. 48 executions were carried out between 2017 and 2018



MOTIVATIONS FOR RESEARCH

- Wide Difference in Attitudes
- Both retentionists and abolitionists' have developed ritualistic arguments on the key issues of the controversy.
- Confusion has resulted from this ensuing debate.



METHODOLOGY

- Type: Quantitative, Empirical Secondary Analysis
- Source: MicroCase (2013), GSS (2006) File and GSS (2008) File
- Type of Data: Individual Data, Survey Research
- No. of Cases: 4510 (GSS 2006 File), 3559 (GSS 2008 File)
- Period: 2006-2008
- Statistical Significance: p<0.05
- Measures of Association: Gamma and Cramer's V

Support for Capital Punishment



Findings and Analysis

Factors that significantly influence attitudes toward capital punishment:

- 1. Party Affiliation 2. Opinion on Courts
- 3. Confidence in Government 4. Race 5. Racial Disparity

Factors that do not significantly influence attitudes toward capital punishment:

1. Crime Spending Opinion 2. Income

Factors that do not have correlation with attitudes toward capital punishment:

1. Education 2. Religiosity



Conclusion

- Political Factors and Social Factors are most influential in considerations regarding capital punishment.
- Implications:
 - 1. Republicans are recommended to favor the capital punishment.
 - 2. Democrats are recommended to stick to two strategies:

(a)For the short run, try to make the system of capital punishment more fair.

(b)For the long run, get involved in social movements that strive to abolish capital punishment.

• For Future Research: An independent variable that checks people's emotional value to political choice could be a very strong variable, thus, helping in answering the research question in a clear way.
