



ABOUT GENERAL H. HUGH SHELTON

General H. Hugh Shelton was born in Tarboro, N.C., and received a bachelor's degree from North Carolina State University.

He spent the next 38 years in a variety of command and staff positions in the United States, Vietnam, the Middle East, and Haiti. He served two combat tours in Vietnam, participated in the liberation of Kuwait during Operation Desert Shield/Storm, and led the Joint Task Force that restored democracy in Haiti.

General Shelton became the 14th Chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff on Oct. 1, 1997, and served two two-year terms, retiring Sept. 30, 2001. Throughout his tenure as chairman, U.S. forces were in high demand and participated in numerous joint operations around the globe.

Currently, General Shelton is the Executive Director of the General Hugh Shelton Leadership Center at N.C. State University and serves as Director of the Hugh and Carolyn Shelton Military Neurotrauma Foundation in Washington, D.C.

The Shelton Leadership Camp is a one-week summer residential experience for rising 9th, 10th, 11th, and 12th graders that takes place on the campus of Methodist University in Fayetteville, N.C.

The camp is designed to help students expand their knowledge and skills of what it takes to be an effective leader. General Shelton's cornerstones of values-based leadership – honesty, integrity, compassion, diversity, and social responsibility – are the foundations of the experience. The core curriculum includes leadership roles and accountability, team building, leadership styles and situations, public speaking, and goal setting.



COST TO ATTEND

The cost to attend is \$600 for the week-long residential summer leadership camp. This includes the deposit, lodging, meals, all curriculum materials, low and high ropes training, transportation during the week, and evening activities. When submitting your application, please include a \$100 deposit to reserve your spot in the program. The balance remaining is due by June 15, 2022.

If the applicant is not accepted, the \$100 will be refunded. If an accepted applicant chooses not to attend the program, the deposit will not be refunded.
